- Ask the right questions in the right order.
 - Get them hooked
 - Start simple and progress to more involved
- Goal to think and apply knowledge (higher order thinking skills)
 - Lots of people thinking
 - Personal learning
- Reflection is key

Reflection is

linking and constructing meaning from experiences



Parts to reflection

- * Taking a current experience and linking it to a previous learning
- * Involves both mental and emotional components
- *Synthesizing and evaluating data
- * It enhances the meaning of something



What does the Bible say about reflection?

- ▶ 2 Cor.13:5 Examine yourselves to see whether you are in the faith
- Lam 3:40 Let us <u>examine our ways and test</u> them, and let us return to the Lord.
- Ps. 4:4 when you are on your beds, search your hearts and be silent.
- Jer. 6:16 Stand at the crossroads and look; ask for the ancient paths, ask where the good way is, and walk in it, and you will find rest for your souls.
- ▶ Gal. 6:4 Each one should <u>test their own actions</u>. Then they can take pride in themselves alone, without comparing themselves to someone else
- Matt. 7:3 Why do you look at the speck of sawdust in your brother's eye and <u>pay no</u> <u>attention to the plank in your own eye</u>?

How do you get kids to reflect?

- Start Simple a question that everyone can respond to scale of 1-5, thumbs up or down, raise your hand if ...
- Observe and listen to what is said and done
- Ask questions sequentially:
 - what? (DATA)
 - So what? (ANALYZE)
 - □ Now what? (TRANSFER)
- Let students talk with a partner or a group - 1 answer for the group
- Be aware of group dynamics
- Age appropriate


